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Barton peveril sixth form college term dates

The college has remained open throughout the Covid-19 pandemic and since the beginning of the academic year students have returned to on-site teaching for all, or most of their scheduled hours in accordance with government guidelines, which are closely monitored. In view of the Covid-19 pandemic, the first deadline of the academic year 2020/2021 has changed the college calendar and the College has introduced a two-week October half-life break. This break is from Monday, 19 to 23 October (by phone/e-mail requests open) and closed from Monday 26 October to Friday from 30 October (phone/email requests closed until Monday, November 2). Opening hours for students and community members are from 8:30 a.m. Monday to Friday. The opening of the weekend is based on only a planned activity. It is part of the Wessex Group's Sixth Form College. [3] Originally, The History Barton Peveril School was a temporary school founded in 1904 by the local county education authority to meet the requirements of the new railway town of Eastleigh. It took two long serving heads of teachers, with Miss Annie Smith at the reins from the beginning until her retirement in 1936 and then Mr. R.N., Moore, who again only retired in 1963. He was replaced by Mr Bowyer. As the school expanded, larger rooms were needed, with a house named Barton Peveril purchased in 1918, which later gave its name to an institution officially recognized as Eastleigh County High School, Barton Peveril. 1932 was another step, this time to a building on Desborough Road that had previously been used at the school, with a move marked by the name of Eastleigh County High School. In 1957, the school moved to its current place and returned its original name to Barton Peveril School. The last consumption of public coeducational gymnastics was in 1972. In 2002, there was a GBP 11.5 million building transformation project. [5] The Rose Building was built in 2006 for £7 million to provide opportunities for topics such as sport, the media and performing arts. This building houses the Rose Theatre, which hosts several college and external events and works. [8] In the summer of 2011, the library underwent a £500,000 renovation, increasing the available study space and doubling the number of computers. The library was renamed the Glyn Library, followed by the former principal Godfrey Glyn OBE, and was opened by the then Lord Lieutenant of Hampshire, Dame Mary Fagan. [9] In 2013, a Nobel building was opened, offering facilities for mathematics, computer science, psychology, criminology, geography and the media; This is Media Studio and Radio Radi engineering laboratory. [12] Curriculum College has over 60 A-level and professional courses available, as well as an enrichment event program called Q-XTRA. [13] The college focuses on preparing students for life after college, including higher education, apprenticeships or employment. [14] As of 2018, the majority of students choose three A-levels (or equivalent professional courses) with the possibility of enrichment; this may include the qualifications. In October 2002, the college was given Beacon Status, an award that celebrates teaching providers that provide outstanding teaching and learning to allow students at all levels to work effectively and independently. [16] In January, Barton Peveril was awarded the Tes FE Award for the use of outstanding technologies to improve the Award for Teaching, Learning and Evaluation. [17] In 2018, the College launched a new programme of enrichment activities Q-XTRA[18] which offers students a wide range of measures to improve the situation in one of four areas: Health, Community, Skills and Employment. Multiple college chores take place throughout the year. Recent works have included the Addams Family, Sister Act and 1950 Immersive Theatre event, where the college was transformed into an American High School from 1958. [19] Students can play Football, [20] Hockey, [21] Netball, [22] Rugby, [23] Basketball, [24] Tennis and Badminton. In 2019, Barton Peveril became an accredited talent scholarship scheme (TASS). Tass Dual Career Accreditation System, run by Sport England, ensures that elite athletes can compete at the highest level while studying. [25] Students are not only led by staff, but also by students who are encouraged to set up and manage their own groups as part of the Q-XTRA programme. Examples of student lead groups are the Gay Straight Alliance, the Christian Union and the Debating Society. The competition recorded what it praised the BBC in part because every part of the college record was completely down to the students themselves. In 2009, Barton Peveril Jazz Ensemble won the National Music Festival for Youth. Other ensemble and flute choir. Other extracurricular performing arts options include shows such as the 2012 musical West Side Story[27] and the annual Rock Challenge dance competition.
